TOP SCHOOL IN LANCASHIRE GCSE 2020 RESULTS

Over 270 grades 8 and 9 were achieved across many subjects

For the last three years we have been the top performing secondary school for progress in the whole of Lancashire. This year our progress score has gone up, and the school is 11th in the whole country.

A fantastic achievement! A special well done to Sameena Isat, Aiza Asif, Saba Bibi, Kawthar Bodi, Fowziyah Adam and Ammaarah Ingar who between them have netted an impressive 60 grades at grades 8 and 9, the highest available.

Our most improved pupil is Ammaarah Ingar who, on average, made almost four grades more progress than she would have been expected to make. That is an amazing achievement.

Grades 8 and 9 demonstrate the very highest performance of pupils across the country, and PMGHS are delighted to report that over 300 grades 8 and 9 (169 grades at 8 and 133 grades at 9) were achieved across all of the subjects.

Almost 60% (58.1%) of all of the grades achieved in the school were at grades 9 - 7, with 98.2% of the grades being at 9 - 4. This was an increase from the 2019 results which saw 48% at grades 9 - 7 and 91% at grades 9 - 4.

Our headlines are:

- 12 subjects achieved 100% pass rates
- 17 subjects achieved + 90%
- Almost 60% of all grades achieved were the top grades 7, 8, * 9 (equivalent to grades A and A*)

Congratulations to all our pupils. Their results give them an excellent foundation to build upon. In addition, many thanks to parents and governors for all their support.

When I leave education, I would love to become a dialysis nurse or work in the health care profession because my dad was a dialysis patient and watching the nurses and doctors who were there to help and support him have really inspired me with the work that they do.

Sunnah Fast

Monday and Thursday Sunnah Fast Programme Nov - Jan 2020/2021

As part of the development of pupils' spirituality, the school will be launching the 'Monday and Thursday Fast Programme' from week beginning 9th November 2020. With daylight hours now shortening, it is felt that this Sunnah (practice) can now be revived in our school till the end of January 2021. The Prophet (peace and blessings be upon him) encouraged his followers to fast on these days.

- Aa'ishah (may the Almighty be pleased with her) narrated: The Prophet (peace and blessings of the Almighty be upon him) was keen to fast on Mondays and Thursdays. (Tirmidhi, Nasaa'i, Ibn Maajah)
- Abu Hurayrah (may the Almighty be pleased with him) narrated that the Messenger of the Almighty (peace and blessings of the Almighty be upon him) said: "Deeds are shown (to the Almighty) on Mondays and Thursdays, and I like my deeds to be shown when I am fasting." (Tirmidhi)
- Sahl ibn Sa'd reported that the prophet peace be upon him, said: "There is a gate to Paradise that is called Ar-Rayyaan. On the Day of resurrection, it will say: 'where are those who fasted?' When the last one has passed through the gate will be locked." [Al-Bukhaari and Muslim]

Fasting encourages selfdiscipline and empathy for those who are impoverished, however, we are keen to stress that this fast is optional. Pupils must be mindful that Mondays and Thursdays will be normal school days and they must be physically well to manage the fast, without letting it affect their learning.

I hope and pray that these small actions nurture and develop invaluable qualities and ethics within us all.

Shura and Council Representatives

We believe in developing pupils' self-esteem and confidence. Through the Student and Shura Councils pupils are encouraged to voice their opinions and play an active role in their school community. Each form elects its own representatives for both councils which meet regularly. These groups are important in shaping the character of the school and in developing pupil leadership skills.

Student Council and Shura Reps consists of keen and willing members who put themselves forward for the roles. The reps usually meet in week 4 of every term to discuss pertinent issues and raise them with the staff and governors. A small group of Student Council representatives from each year group held a socially distant meeting in the school hall with Mufti Javid, to discuss how the girls felt being back to school with the new Covid -19 arrangements. All year groups agreed they have settled in well and are thoroughly enjoying school. All girls represented their year groups with great confidence and passion. Ammara, our Head Girl has also set up a MS Teams group and will be using it to share communications with the rest of the girls.

In addition, we are continuing with our weekly Hadeeth and Sunnah Programme and Halaqahs. There is also a weekly spiritual goal set for the pupils, and they are rewarded weekly for completing the goals through achievement points. Alongside the Spiritual goal we have introduced academic goals which will focus on their targets for learning.

This term our pupils have been studying the 'Khulafaa Rashidun in their Halaqahs (The 4 rightly guided caliphs). The girls have demonstrated great enthusiasm in trying their utmost best to emulate the qualities of these great companions.

Fifth year into our Sri Lankan Orphans Sponsorship Programme

As we approach the end of this half term, I would like to take this opportunity to remind you that we have launched our fundraising commitment for the Sri Lankan Orphans. We are now in the fifth year of our Sri Lankan Orphans Programme, with each form supporting a named orphan, we now have a total of 18 orphans Alhamd..., and the pupils' donations have made a huge difference.

CLICK AND COLLECT UBRARY SERVICE

- 1. Pupils go to:microlibrarian.netusing any computer or mobile phone.
- 2. Pupils log in using their school email address (e.g. dahl@student.pmghs.com or for Year 7s jacqueline.wilson2020@student.pmghs.com).
- 3. Pupils enter their password which is set as their date of birth, 8 digits with no spaces or characters e.g. 01022005. We recommend that pupils change their password to ensure their account is kept secure.
- 4. Pupils can then view, search for and reserve the books that they wish to read (a maximum of two reservations can be placed at a time).
- 5. Once a pupil has reserved a book, it will be delivered to their form room as soon as it is available by Miss Packwood or Miss Smalley at break/lunch times.
- 6. Books can be kept for up to two weeks and can be returned to Miss Packwood or Miss Smalley as they visit form rooms.

There is a hardly a week that goes by without a different piece of research confirming the importance of reading in a child's development. Your child was taught to read at primary school and no doubt you supported this process by ensuring they brought home reading books and you listened to them read. Once at secondary school, parental involvement in reading tends to wane therefore we strongly encourage you to help your daughter to read as often and as widely as possible. Here are a few ideas to get your teenager reading again:

- Keep reading material all over the house, including the kitchen, car and wherever there is a captive audience!
- Model reading. If your son/daughter sees you reading, conversation naturally follows.
- Graphic novels (once dismissed as comics) are now recognised as literature; they may be the key to getting your teenager hooked on books.
- Merge movies with books. Offer your daughter the print version to read before a big film adaptation comes out on film.
- Buy them a book as a present. Any number of websites recommend books for teenagers.
- Ask your daughter to tell you something (characters/plot/twist) about the book they are reading.

IMPORTANT REMINDERS

As we approach winter, please allow extra travel time to ensure that your daughter arrives at school on-time. In bad weather she should bring a coat preferably dark navy or black.

We would like to stress the importance of ensuring that all our pupils are fully equipped with resources, packed lunches and PE kits before they come to school. This will minimise unnecessary contact in and out of school for parents and allow us to adhere to government guidelines in keeping all our pupils, staff and parents safe.

Drop off/Pick up times - Can we please implore you to be extra considerate to local residents when you are dropping off or waiting to collect your daughters at the end of the school day. In particular, the residents of Deepdale Mill and Isherwood street are finding it increasingly busy at the beginning and end of a school day, to get to and from their vehicles and are sometimes unable to park outside their own homes.

Finally, the deadline to apply for a secondary school place for September 2021 is 31 October 2020.
