







MASS-COVID TESTING

The whole school COVID testing went extremely well with minimal disruption to lessons. We have carried out almost 1,200 tests over a period of six days. A phenomenal achievement! This has certainly been a team effort and We cannot thank enough all the



people involved. As you can imagine, the organisation of the testing has involved hours of meticulous planning and careful consideration of all the safety issues. Our Business Manager, Mr Polli, and his team led by Ms Rawat, deserve considerable praise for the way they coordinated the testing regime in such a short space of time.

After three lateral flow tests done in school, pupils have been provided with COVID-19 Self-Test (Rapid Antigen Test) kits to self- swab and test themselves twice a week at home. Please speak to your daughter about this kit which will probably be somewhere buried in their school bag no doubt! The results must be reported to NHS Test and Trace as soon as the test is completed either online or by telephone as per instructions in the home test kit. According to the DfE, 'adolescents aged 12 to 17 should self-test and report with adult supervision. The adult may conduct the test if necessary. Children aged 11 attending a secondary school may be tested by an adult.' Following

three tests here at school, our experience is that all pupils can manage the testing process themselves. If your daughter tests positive, please inform us at the earliest opportunity: they will need to self-isolate in accordance with the stay-at-home guidance. A labbased polymerase chain reaction (PCR) test will also be required.

We would also like to say a massive thank you to all our pupils. They took part in the process with minimal fuss and, as ever, their behaviour was a credit to you as parents, and to the school.



TEACHERS' THOUGHTS ON RETURNING TO SCHOOL

Returning to school has a been a bit of a roller coaster ride, with some real highs, lots of squeals, a few twists and turns and some low points.

It's been lovely to see people again, staff and students and hear the hum of the hustle and bustle of school. Generally, students have been enthusiastic about being back in school and have resumed their learning with energy and commitment. 

What did the Christians Crusaders learn from the Muslim





Foods
