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


What would you like to do when you leave education?



For many of the girls, this will have been their first interview experience and will be an important step as they prepare for college, university, and future employment. Some of our Year 10 pupils attended an event at Lancaster University School of Mathematics (LUSOM), a partnership between Lancaster University and Cardinal Newman College). For those who want to go into a mathematics-based university education, LUSOM offers able young people access to world-class preparation at a standard which is unavailable within the mainstream state school system. Pupils had the opportunity to find out about the different maths options available after GCSEs: Maths A-level, Further Maths A-level, Core Maths and A-level Statistics. They participated in a taster lesson with one of the specialists at the College. Pupils also attended a talk by Simon Singh MBE, author of 'Fermat's Last Theorem', 'The Code Book' and 'The Simpsons and their Mathematical Secrets'.

The LUSoM event was intriguing, fascinating, and educational. The important of Mathematics is often not appreciated or known, however today we learnt the significance of Maths and the beauty of equations. Most careers involve maths and logical thinking. The next step of our educational life may also depend on Maths as it is a broad subject. Many people have spent their lives searching for an answer to their problems. To solve these riddles, is to complete the impossible, leaving behind a legacy and our very own unique mark on the world. Simon Singh, the guest speaker, introduced us to his writings and research on the wonders of Mathematics and the way in which this subject has changed lives. His speech inspired our students to reflect on their future and to pursue their individual passions. We also participated in a workshop, where teamwork and thinking were vital. It is true to say that the riddles triggered something in our minds; they were difficult, but we enjoyed answering them to the best of our ability!

ENRICHMENT DAY

19TH OCTOBER 2023

All pupils took part in our first Enrichment Day of the year in October. For our Year 7 pupils, this centred around personal hygiene and well-being. These sessions were led by a small group of dedicated staff, who enlisted support from volunteers within the community. Our Year 8 and Year 9 pupils worked in mixed groups to complete activities focused on languages. Pupils were tasked with designing a café, using their MFL language to pitch their business idea and produce promotional materials, such as menus. The pupils were enthusiastic and engaged, and they very much enjoyed the element of competition.

Our Year 10 pupils spent the day completing workshops with 'Talk the Talk'. This is a charity which provides a range of practical workshops to develop speaking skills, delivered to our girls by professional experts. The workshops focused on the development of confidence when speaking publicly. The workshop also supported our careers curriculum, by linking the learning to future careers.

EXTRA-CURRICULAR CLUBS

There are a wide range of after-school clubs and lunchtime activities for girls to get involved in. Our Football Club is coached by staff from PNE. Their coaching expertise enhances our PE curriculum's football programme and raise its profile in the school. The sessions are open to all KS3 pupils and have recently focused on football skills and drills.

Our Taekwondo Club has continued for KS3 pupils this term, led by Taekwondo Titans. The after-school club has focused on skills development, and pupils have enjoyed widening their skills set, with benefits including improved cardiovascular health, increased selfesteem, and better discipline.







We have trialled an after-school Netball Club this half term, with over 20 pupils taking the opportunity to develop their skills with a local coach. Pupils have been engaged and enthusiastic, and we look forward to continuing to offer this club in the new year.

On Fridays, after-school the Year 8 Baking Club meets. The girls enjoy the sessions, and they have the opportunity to bake and sample different foods every week whilst deepening their understanding of nutrition.

Our lunchtime clubs programme has also included a wide range of opportunities: Writing and Drama club, Spirituality Club, Knitting and Mindfulness clubs. We have taken on board feedback from the pupils and in the new year we will be extending our knitting club to allow more time for skills development and practise.




LET'S KICK RACISM OUT OF FOOTBALL

From being forced into a karate club, to joining the British ITF championship last minute and winning a silver, my martial arts journey has grown and shaped me in ways I could never imagine. On the 2nd of December, I was told that I was competing at the British Championship, which was the next day. I did not even train once. But, Alhamdulillah, I managed to somehow get a silver, being only one point away from a gold. I never expected to do martial arts as a kid - in fact, I hated it, but now it is a crucial part of my identity. It is a common misconception that all martial arts do is make you a harsh person, but it is the opposite. Martial arts are not just about striking people and screaming-it is an art form, that nurtures a person's discipline, confidence and kindness. It is the reason I believe in myself even at my lowest moments, the reason I speak out and the reason I am at peace.

My goals in martial arts are quite extreme. I dream of being a world champion, an Olympian; to start my own business and club and to inspire young people to follow their dreams. As a child, once I started martial arts, it grew on me, and that is when I knew I wanted to be the best. I had to be the best. I will be the best. But never did I have anyone to look up to- all the icons, all my instructors, all the successful martial artists were all men, and I failed to find one female martial artist that was truly respected. Having grown and matured, I finally decided it is time to change that. A woman can be an icon and inspiration for both men and women, and it is my mission to prove it. Martial arts are not just for men - it is for anyone and everyone that wants to live a disciplined life, that wants to improve fitness or even meet new people. To anyone being forced into a sport, or hesitating to follow their dreams, or even wanting to do martial arts, do it. Dream big, think creatively, and never let society tell you cannot do something, because I went from thinking I could never be successful in martial arts, to being a 5-time gold regional champion and winning a silver medal in the British Championship. Never give up, you might just end up joining a British championship last minute and making it to top three.
