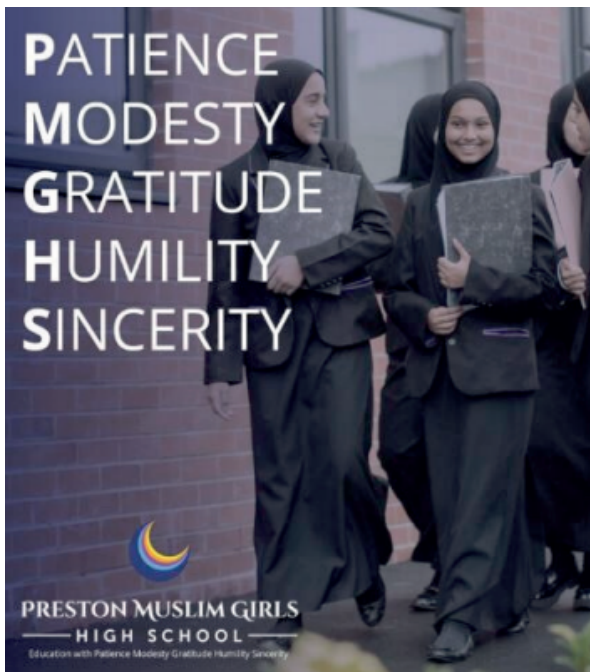

What is your favourite subject and why?

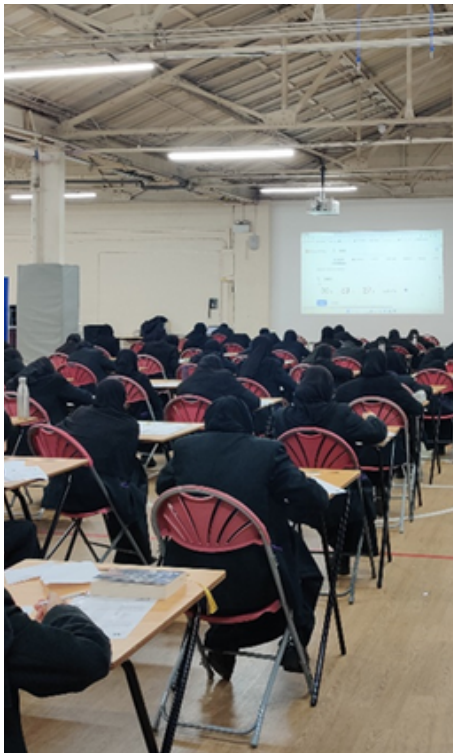

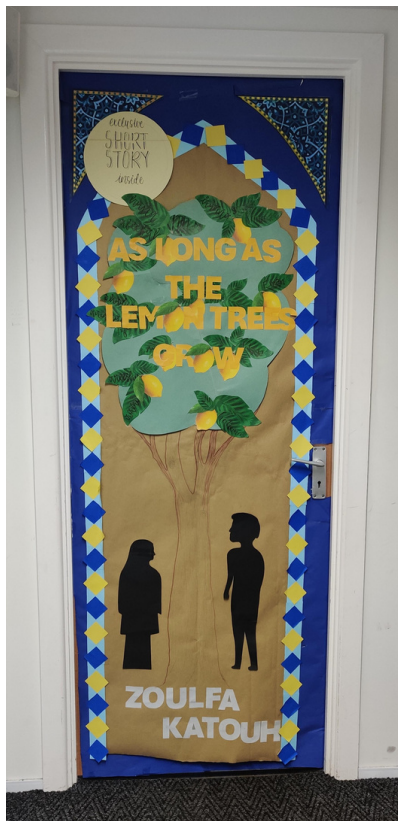

TRIP TO ROCCIA



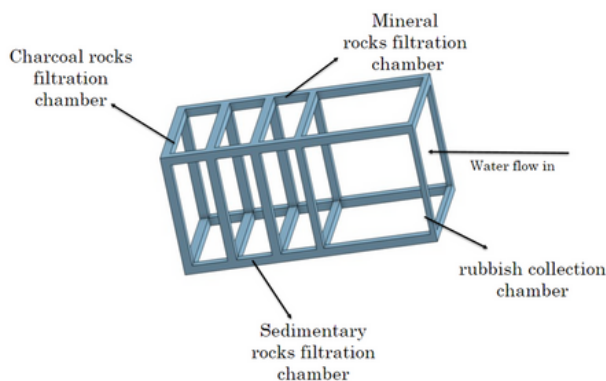

DT COMPETITION

YEAR 9

This product is designed to clean and purify flowing waterways such as canals and rivers. Through our research, we have found that many canals are polluted. Our aim is to remove the rubbish.



Our first design idea was made up by thinking of ways to remove the rubbish while the canal runs its usual cycle. We considered making a box which collects rubbish that would need to be removed by a handle (this may have to be filtered every day or week). We also thought about oils and other smaller waste pollution, so we decided to include natural water filters, such as mineral rocks, sedimentary rocks and charcoal. We then thought of adding more boxes containing the filtering rocks.

Our design has four compartments, each one dedicated to cleansing and purifying the water. In the first compartment litter will be collected as water runs through, it will then flow through stone, sand and charcoal, trapping and removing impurities from the water. Water purification systems are widely known for the ability to lower the risk of dangerous diseases such as gastrointestinal disease, by 80%.

They toured the College and looked at the different facilities it has to offer, including the sports facilities, cafeteria, study and social spaces. They had the opportunity to talk with a variety of subject teachers, who were able to inform and advise on their different subject choices. UCLAN NURSING

CAREERS - YEAR 7

We invited local nursing professionals into school to talk to the Year 7 about their own unique career journeys as part of the Careers PSHE lesson. Leyland Trucks operates as one of Europe's most advanced truck assembly facilities, The Leyland Assembly Plant. The company's future development is focused on the use of the latest technologies and the application of information technology in all aspects of truck design, manufacture, procurement and logistics.



During this visit, pupils were given a tour of the assembly facilities and had the opportunity to learn about the apprenticeship schemes they have to offer, and the many job roles available within the company.

The trip to Leyland trucks inspired us to join the world of design, to build for the world and help support society in their safe travels. Whether in an apprenticeship or a job, Leyland Trucks proved how important it is that women who want to pursue this career should never be afraid to follow their dreams. Students were guided through the factory and were fascinated by the work of the skilled employees. I saw how rapidly technology was developing and the wonders of robots.

The variety of machines and the way they were built and used was captivating, and sparked many questions in our minds. After our tour, we had the opportunity to go inside the trucks and imagine ourselves in the future when we will rely on these vehicles or may even see them passing by. We learnt to appreciate the hard work that goes into these trucks and the people who build them.

The trucks were vibrant and colourful in their design. I got to sit in the driver's seat and look at my fellow pupils as they asked many questions of the workers there. Overall, it was a memorable experience filled with interest, knowledge and creativity.

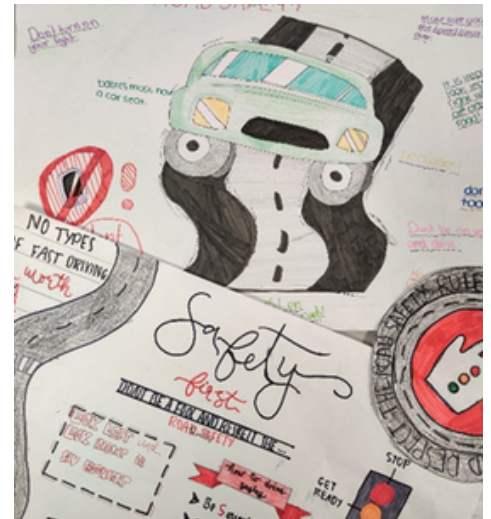


ENRICHMENT DAY

'ROAD SAFETY' MINDFULNESS AND WELL BEING

The second enrichment day for the year took place immediately before the end of the Autumn term, focusing on the theme of road safety. To start the day, our pupils in Years 10 and 11 had an assembly delivered by Lancashire Fire and Rescue as part of the 'Wasted Lives' campaign. This provided information and advice about how to keep safe both when travelling as a passenger, and as a pedestrian. Following the assembly, the initial session of the day focused on road safety incidents and statistics in our local area, and pupils completed tasks to help them to better consider their walking routes. Pupils worked together to complete a driver hazard perception test, highlighting the large amount of information that drivers must act on when driving. After this initial learning phase, pupils in Years 7-10 formed teams and worked together to create a poster campaign, a slogan and an acted advert relating to road safety, each of which was presented to the judging panel. A winning team was selected in each form to act out their advert for all pupils in Years 7-10, plus the judges. Following this, winners were rewarded in each year group for their creativity and the coherence of their road safety campaigns together, and we hope that their learning will help to keep them safe for years to come.

As part of the Autumn enrichment day, the Year 11 pupils took part in enrichment activities after lunch as a reward for their efforts during their mock exams. Pupils were given a choice of taking part in sessions of restorative yoga, crochet, sewing, origami and mindfulness to promote wellbeing. We are sure that the pupils enjoyed the slower pace for the afternoon!



For Safer Internet Day in February, we held an enrichment session in the afternoon for pupils in Years 7-10. The girls completed tasks to learn about the impact that online content can have (both positive and negative), the way that technology has been designed to target and influence users' choices and behaviour, plus the development of strategies to improve people's online experience. This learning is invaluable in equipping our pupils with the skills they need to safely navigate the internet.
