

2024







AWARD TREATS PASTORAL



YEAR 11



Year 11 pupils have been developing their interview skills by taking part in Mock Interviews this term. Local employers volunteered their precious time to come into school and put our girls through their paces!







CHARITY WORK TREE PLANTING




